OntoLex Workshop
(IJCNLP-05, 15 October 2005)

Description:

In the workshop most of the papers were mostly about ontologies.

Papers:

Out of 13 papers, 12 were presented. One of the most interesting presentation was “The Omega Ontology” (Eduard Hovy). It contains, among other things, problems that might appear when merging ontologies. Some of them are interesting to consider when merging lexicons (for ManageLex).

Presentation:

The presentation was successful. I had 30 minutes (presentation and questions). I talked approx. 15 minutes and then I made a small demo. The questions that I was asked were:

1. If we considered GOLD (General Ontology of Linguistic Description) when building LexMod
2. How exactly is the merging operation done
3. If we want to finish the tool and when do we believe it will be ready.

Organization:

4 sessions of about 90 or 60 minutes. There were 7 long (30 minutes) and 4 short (15 minutes) papers/presentations.

All things (beamer, microphone, illumination, etc.) were very well organized.

Statistical data:

12 presentations, approx. 40-50 participants.

Next OntoLex workshop it will probably be at LREC, May 2006 Italy. (“Interfacing Ontologies and Lexical Resources for Semantic Web Technologies”)

Important: Possibility of publishing a book at Cambridge Press (Studies in NLP) with the papers from the OntoLex workshops. We will be announced in this direction by the organizers.

Expenses:
